A new reporting centre to report hate crime to the police.

A hate crime is defined as:

"Any criminal offence which is perceived by the victim or any other person, to be motivated by hostility or prejudice, based on a person's disability or perceived disability; race or perceived race; or religion or perceived religion; or sexual orientation or perceived sexual orientation or transgender identity or perceived transgender identity."

We know that across the country, and across Islington, the number of hate crime reports made to the police in relation to disability is extremely low. Evidence suggests that many disabled people choose not to report for a number of reasons including lack of confidence in how to do so.

So, The Elfrida Society now as an additional advocacy service for people with learning disabilities and neurodiversity to receive support to report hate crime to the police, either online or in person at a police station. Reports can be made in a private and safe environment with a trusted member of staff. We will also offer onward signposting to helpful organisations such as Stop Hate Crime UK and Victim Support.

Our designated Hate Crime Advocate will also provide free training sessions and events to share resources and information.

Please note, this service is only for reporting hate crime and not reporting general crime or emergencies.
